From Swedish *fotboll* and the suffix *-is* for abbreviated words.

Etymology

From Proto-Indo-European **ǵʰéw-tis* ~ **ǵʰu-téy-s*, from **ǵʰew-*.^[1] Compare Latin *fundō* (“I pour out”) and *fūtilis* (“leaky; futile”).

Pronunciation

- (*Classical*) IPA^(key): /ˈfuː.tis/, [ˈfuː.t̪ɪs]

fūtis *f.* (genitive **fūtis**); *third declension*

1. a pitcher

Third-declension noun (i-stem).
